Audience: school administrators, curriculum coordinators, student-services staff, program directors, admissions teams, registrars, and education operations leaders

Focus: An education administration English curriculum for enrollment, student support, curriculum planning, parent communication, faculty coordination, compliance, accreditation, and institutional decision-making.

Designed for advanced ESL learners who already use professional English and need industry-specific terminology, realistic meetings, role-play pressure, careful pushback, and polished workplace outputs.

Teaching stance: this is language and workplace-communication training, not legal, medical, financial, safety, or regulatory advice. Instructors should connect every scenario to the learner's current company policies, local rules, and approved procedures.

How to Use This Workbook

For each module, define the terms, identify the decision pressure, write a careful response, and practice the conversation aloud. Strong answers are specific, calm, evidence-aware, and tied to owner and next step.

Module 1. Enrollment, Admissions, and Placement

Situation

A program has more qualified applicants than seats.

Stakeholder pressure: Accept the loudest families first.

Constraint: Admission criteria, placement evidence, capacity, and equity need transparent handling.

Terms to use

- admissions criteria

Module 2. Curriculum Planning and Learning Outcomes

Situation

A department wants to add content without changing assessments.

Stakeholder pressure: Insert the new unit.

Constraint: Standards, outcomes, sequence, assessment, and workload must align.

- curriculum map
- assessment
- standard

Module 3. Student Support and Intervention

Situation

A student is failing multiple classes.

Stakeholder pressure: Tell the family the student is not trying.

Constraint: Attendance, assessment data, accommodations, behavior, and support plans need review.

Terms to use

- intervention
- accommodation
- attendance

- student support

Module 4. Parent and Guardian Communication

Situation

A parent disputes a disciplinary decision.

Stakeholder pressure: Defend the school policy firmly.

Constraint: Facts, policy, student privacy, appeal options, and empathy must be balanced.

Terms to use

- guardian communication
- discipline
- appeal
- confidentiality

Module 5. Faculty Coordination and Evaluation

Situation

A teacher receives complaints about inconsistent grading.

Stakeholder pressure: Say students are unhappy.

Constraint: Rubrics, grading policy, classroom evidence, and professional support are needed.

- rubric
- grading policy
- observation
- professional development

Module 6. Compliance, Records, and Privacy

Situation

A staff member wants to share student records by email.

Stakeholder pressure: Send the files because the request is internal.

Constraint: Need-to-know access, secure handling, and privacy policy must be confirmed.

Terms to use

- FERPA
- student record
- need to know
- secure handling

Module 7. Accreditation and Program Review

Situation

A program review finds weak outcome data.

Stakeholder pressure: Write that improvements are in progress.

Constraint: Evidence, assessment cycle, action plan, and ownership must be documented.

- evidence
- action plan

Module 8. Budget, Staffing, and Institutional Priorities

Situation

A school wants to launch a new program with no additional staff.

Stakeholder pressure: Ask existing staff to absorb it.

Constraint: Workload, student impact, compliance, and sustainability need evaluation.

Terms to use

- budget
- staffing model
- workload
- sustainability
